TOPIC: Fish Farming in a Psychotic BC

Minutes of February 11, 2003

Attendance: 109 with 2 guests

President Don Farquhar opened the meeting by asking John Hopkins and Leo Sauve to update the meeting on the 2003 Annual Convention. They reported that 90 people were expected at the Thursday Banquet (split equally along gender fault lines) and all members were urged to contact either of them about providing gift items for delegates (up to 50) and door prizes for the banquet i.e. not just ideas for, but real prizes. A WALKING TOUR OF DOWNTOWN NEW WESTMINSTER

-the oldest Canadian city west of the Great Lakes-Wednesday, May 7/03, 10.00 AM to 3.00 PM

or

Tuesday, May 27/03, 10.00 AM to 3.00 PM

Beginning and ending in the Concourse of

WATERFRONT STATION, CORDOVA STREET, VANCOUVER

We will meet in the middle of the station concourse by the brass framed sign at 09.50 in preparation for our departure at 10.00 sharp. We will travel to Columbia Street Station in New Westminster on the Sky Train Expo Line and will return from New Wesminster Quay on the new Millennium Line, "the most visually stunning public transit journey on the continent!". It is suggested that

you buy a Translink day pass ahead of time from a 7-eleven Store or Safeway. Make sure you have an appropriate ticket before our departure.

- 10.00, departure from Waterfront Station, Vancouver.
- 10.30, arrive Columbia Street Station, New Westminster where we meet Archie Miller and commence our tour. The tour will include descriptions of the early colonial capital and identify sites of early buildings and events. Reference will be made at various points to the City's Great Fire of 1898 which destroyed much of the downtown. The tour will end at New Westminster Quay, a former industrial and shopping area now reclaimed for public market use.
- 12.30, a soup and sandwich lunch with sweet and beverage will be served to us in Fraser's Restaurant on board the Royal City Star tied up at the Quay.
- 1.30, further local explorations at the Quay and departing summary comments.
- 2.00, departure on the Millennium Line at Waterfront Station, Vancouver.

Wear comfortable walking shoes and be prepared for some strenuous stair climbs at new Westminster Quay and at the skytrain Stations.

Tours will be restricted to 30 participants including members and spouses/partners. The total cost for each participant will be \$17.00 which includes the services of our guide and lunch. For further information please contact Chris Lee at 604-926-1022.


The only reason I am clinging to life at all is to see what the hell is coming next!

DR. BRAD HICKS

Dr. Hicks holds degrees in Fish and Wildlife Biology, Veterinary Medicine and Fish Pathology. He is a certified fisheries scientist and registered professional biologist. He has published numerous articles on fish health, fish farm business management and the politics of fish farming.

After several years working as a fish Pathologist and researcher at the University of Guelph, Dr. Hicks moved to BC in 1987 as the Provincial Fish Health Pathologist. In BC he worked extensively with the fish farming industry and with the Provincial and Federal governments on fish health issues, both wild and farmed.

Dr. Hicks found it difficult to work within the constraints of government so in 1988 he joined the fish farming industry as the operations manager for one of BC's fledgling fish farming companies. In the space of 10



operations in BC, Ontario, Maine, Florida, and Chile and with sales of \$40,000,000. International Aqua foods grew Atlantic salmon, Pacific salmon (chinook), trout, black cod and tilapia. And had experience with the "so-called" closed containment systems.

In 1999, International Aqua Foods was sold and Dr. Hicks is presently a partner in a Canadian feed company with operations in BC and with sales in NB, Ont., NFLD., USA, Japan, Spain, Portugal, Chile and the Czech Republic. He also consults on a wide range of fish farming issues.
