Ritchie Bros. Auctioneers is the world's leading industrial auctioneer. Starting from humble beginnings in British Columbia. Ritchie Bros. now

sells more used trucks and equipment than any other company in the world.

Ritchie Bros. has been in business since the 1950's. Starting out as a small furniture store in Kelowna in 1958, Dave Ritchie ran the store with his two brothers. Ken and John. One day they found themselves a little short of cash. They needed two thousand dollars to pay the bank and didn't know where they would find it.

A good friend of theirs suggested holding an auction. The brothers had excess inventory in their store so they took their friend's advice and held their first auction sale. The auction was a success: the brothers came up with the money they needed and decided that the auction business might be a good thing to go into.

After that successful auction, the brothers' auction business grew steadily.

Today Ritchie Bros. has over 110 offices around the world and conducts more than 150 unreserved industrial auctions every year, as well as approximately 100 smaller farm auctions. Total sales in 2004 were approximately USD \$1.8 billion. The Company currently has 30 auction sites around the world, with an average size in excess of 60 acres. Minutes of the September 13th Meeting

Attendance: 143 including 8 guests

President Gordon called the meeting to order and requested guest introductions. Noting that Bill Sauder was absent and unavailable for recognition, he said that Bill was to receive the Order of Canada. After expressing enjoyment as President, Gordon recognized John Hoyle and Fred Cotton for their very early involvement in Probus. Gordon explained the Management Committee changes then thanked Doug Lambert for his unassuming work. He mentioned that no initiations were planned for the next two meeting while attendance is balanced against meeting room capacity. Committee Reports were then requested.

Treasurer, **Bill Manson**: Bill reported that the current Income and Expense Report would be available at the Membership Services Desk after the meeting.

Speaker Committee, **Fred Cotton**: Fred said that John Helliwell will speak in November. Fred asked **Ed Moul** to explain the spectacular growth of a small Kelowna Company providing October's speaker, Mr. Bob Armstrong.

Probus Canada, **Pidge McBride**: Pidge said that the Muskoka Rendezvous starts September 27th and he will give a full report next meeting.

Visits and Entertainment, **George Adams**:
George said that the contract bridge evenings will start on October 17th and that the football night is sold out. The Storyeum visit is set for October 4th, but the CBC Archives visit is cancelled due to the strike.

Arrangements have been made for the December 6th visit to Museum of Flight, in Seattle. George then thanked his committee, and wished **Don Hudson**, the new Chair,

well. President Gordon took this opportunity to ask members with questions regarding events to please call the contacts shown in the Newsletters rather than the Probus office. Answers will be faster and office congestion, minimized.

Newsletter, **Roy Williams**: Roy said that all copy for the next issue should go directly to Barbara Kemp by September 27th, as he will be at Rendezvous.

President Gordon then passed the meeting over to **Denis Creighton** who asked **John Hall** to introduce the speaker.

The 16th meeting of the Communist Party Congress in late 2002 arranged a peaceful transfer of power from the old guard to a group of able young technocrats. These new leaders set 2020 as the economic goal for China to quadruple its GNP. They promptly joined the WTO and that year trade increased 22%. Now Beijing and the coastal region have modern buildings, cars, and well-stocked stores and growth continues! Since 1978 the average income has quadrupled, 220 million people have risen above poverty and inflation is minimal. During Asia's recent economic downturn, China's GNP grew 8 to 9% annually. She is now the world's 6th largest economy, larger than Russia, India and Indonesia combined! She consumes 29% of the world's steel, 31% of the coal and 40% of its cement.

Never the less, China faces major challenges: To satisfy the rural to urban labour trend, China needs to create 22 million jobs annually. As She only creates 7 million, serious unemployment results. Corruption is also serious. Official audits show that 14 billion US dollars or 20% of Government revenues were squandered during the first half of 1999. Decreasing ecology is having its effect; eight of the world's ten most polluted cities are Chinese. China, with only 7% of its land arable, has 22% of the worlds population. Arable land and water supply are decreasing due to urban/industrial sprawl. The wealth distribution and opportunity is uneven and the urban/rural gap is increasing. Urban incomes are three times that of rural areas, which have twice the population. Deep social unrest results. State owned enterprises are inefficient. They represent two thirds of urban workers yet produce one third of the goods. Banks are run politically and increased borrowing adds to bad debt.

Also, Government leadership, while recently impressive, lacks continuation assurance. China's two new leaders, Hu Jintao and Wen Jiabao must prove they have the capability to continue economic reform, and sustain prosperity as well as stability.

While quadrupling the GNP by 2020 is questioned, the Harvard School of Government feels that tripling could well be possible and would still produce startling results: By 2020 China should become the largest consumer market with 500 million middle class citizens. China would be second only to the US in world trade. Such growth is similar to that of the US in the 19th century and Japan in the 20th.

Dr. Drake feels before this target is realized several non-economic considerations must be addressed: Internally, the adverse effects of urban/rural unrest must be contained. The judicial system, banks and power sharing between the three government levals must be improved. External factors must also be revisited. These include; China's relations with Taiwan and its American protector, the concerns of the US and others towards China becoming a threat to power balance and the direction the Hu/Wen Government takes to secure energy supplies.

China wonders why Canada doesn't act to correct the bilateral trade imbalance. In 2004 the \$31 million trade between the two was 24/7 in China's favour! Dr. Drake concluded by expressing his considered belief that China's rapid growth will be peaceful and positive for the world.

During the question period we learned that:

- China buys nuclear power equipment from affordable sources including Canada, France and Russia.
- Calling China a capitalistic dictatorship is over simplification, but partially true.
- China's written rules of law look impressive; though interpreted by the Communist Party, they do allow outside arbitration.
- The China/Russia relationship is

- long-standing hostility. However, they recently formed some alliances against the US.
- China is currently the major foreign holder of US bonds. If dumped on the market a major power struggle could result.

President Denis asked Dick Roberts to thank the speaker.


