November 17, 1998 meeting. Attendance 134. Fifteen guests were introduced. President McBride reminded the membership of the annual Christmas luncheon after the next meeting.

TREASURER: Bill Wallace once again disappointed the membership by failing to declare a dividend. We have 184 paid up members, with 19 delinquent accounts. Six new members enrolled today. We now have \$10,000.00 in the bank., so we are in good financial shape.

ENTERTAINMENT: Bill Manson received 23 suggestions for outings. He will poll the membership.

SPEAKERS: Brice Macdougall announced that next month Philip Shier a retired labour lawyer will speak on his experiences.

John Catchpole introduced our speaker - Mr. Gordon Campbell, leader of the Liberal Party of BC. Mr. Campbell explained that his position had little power within the legislature. All actions of the government are at the sufferance of the ruling party. Mr. Campbell stated that this is "our province" meaning belonging to all the citizens. That we have rich assets that have to be managed properly and that all citizens have the responsibility to participate in this management. He urged all of us to become politically active. "Democracy is not a spectator sport".

The Province is in very bad financial shape at present. The Premier has lost the trus of the people. The economy has been run for seven years by amateurs - not one of Mr. Clark's "A Team" members have business experience. We have a net emigration because of job loss - 17,000 forestry jobs gone in one year. The provincial debt will have doubled to \$37B since the NDP assumed office. The high income, corporate capital, machinery and equipment taxes have driven investment from British Columbia just when the overseas meltdown has toasted our resource industries.

His answer - replace the government one and one half years from now at the next election. How? - by avoiding splitting the anti- NDP vote. He presented evidence that a small swing in Reform votes to the Liberals would ensure victory for the Liberal Party.

Mr. Campbell then spoke of the Liberal's 9 point economic plan copies of which were circulated at the meeting. The highlight - cutting personal income and small business tax immediately. It has been shown repeatedly that doing this will boost the economy. Why haven't the NDP done this? their doctrinaire socialist attitude and union style discipline within the party will not let the members stand up to Premier Clark. Will this not increase the provincial debt? - not if the infusion of money into the economy creates more government revenue. He also rated re-establishment of trust with the people as a high priority.

After a lively question period the speaker was thanked by Charlie Sale and presented with a small gift.

Thirty years of Probus Clubs

Since 1965-66, when the idea of PROBUS (Professional or Business retired or semiretired persons) first began in Welwyn Garden City in England, the growth around the world

was not anticipated.

After 30 years, there are 300,000 members worldwide, with about 1,300 Probus clubs now in the United Kingdom, some 600 in the rest of Europe, 60 in South Africa and a phenomenal 1,750 in Australia-New Zealand alone. In Canada, Probus began in 1987 and is now growing at the rate of 40 per cent per year, with 60 clubs and 5,000 members. Since the name was cleared in the United States; clubs have begun in Washington State and Central Aroostook in Presque Isle, Maine.

Probus Centre-Canada, Inc. is operated by a board of four officers, five past presidents from Rotary and five past presidents of Probus clubs. It is not an official program of Rotary International, but all clubs have been spon-

sored by Rolary clubs.

Probus in Collingwood and Wasaga Beach, towns with a population of 20,000, began with 39 members in the Probus Club of Georgian Triangle in 1987, sponsored as all Probus Clubs by two Rotary Clubs in those towns. It grow to 250 mombers by 1995, the largost in Canada, and was immediately followed by a Probus Mon's Club in Wasaga Beach (social clubs can decide gender), a Women's Probus Club of Pretty River, and a second Men's Probus Club of Blue Mountain in Collingwood. (Clubs may also be combined men and women, decided by those at the first interest meeting.)

The meetings are once monthly, usually for a morning with the attraction of a topical speaker. There are no attendance rules and fees are usually \$25-50 a year. The purpose of the club is strictly to bring together those with a background of responsibility, and club activities are enhanced with optional social events, dinners, shows, sporting events, cards, or other gatherings. Probus clubs are not service clubs, but if you attend a meeting and speak to the members, you will find a sea of volunteer service through other organizations and clubs.

Few members of Probus are Rotarians (5 per cent), and most of these hold membership in both Probus and Rotary, but forming such clubs is an excellent community service. Quoting a lotter sent to the President of the Rotary Club of Collingwood, Tom Baulke, from the President of Probus Centre-Canada, Inc., John Morris, PDG, writes:

"...the Rotary Club of Collingwood is providing fellowship for retired professional and business executives. In total, 365 retirees benefit from this community project... a light pronument to Rotary service that will last for years at no further cost to Rolary, while providing growing comfort and sailsfaction to the recipients of the ·concern."


